In recent years, the College has most certainly built with purpose. There has been an approved and agreed Master Plan supported by the University as well as the College community. It has produced wonderful results for the College with greatly improved facilities and accommodation for more young men than ever before. However, to build with purpose and focus merely on the built environment is to ignore the most important of all bricks and mortar – the men who live here. The College's **Vision** is that King's will be a College "which will enable diverse and innovative young men to serve and pursue individual excellence" while the **Mission** of the College is to "provide a home where men will excel under the most inspiring and enriching conditions."

I recently read yet another article where a "for profit" company announced its intention to build with the sole purpose of providing more accommodation for students (and with little or no intention of providing much more). To continue in this deliberately provocative manner, Rev Evan Burge, long serving Warden of Trinity College at the University of Melbourne observed at his Welcome Dinner in 1974 that.

"It is precisely in these aspects – building a genuine community and ensuring that

the raison d'être of that community is the pursuit of knowledge – that the Warden of a College differs from the manager of a hotel or keeper of a glorified boarding house."

Make no mistake – there are any number of accommodation providers building with one purpose in mind only and it has nothing to do with building a community or the pursuit of knowledge. A "for profit" company can't simply build a large building and house 400 students and claim to be a College – nothing could be further from the truth. A collegiate experience at University is the best possible experience and King's remains committed to ensuring that men who live here will truly benefit from all the building (physical, emotional and spiritual) which is done at King's and this is certainly evidenced in the articles written by Kingsmen Ben Gowen & Henry Watter, later in this edition.



Taking it back a couple of steps, I grew up in Roma, Western Queensland before moving across to the Sunshine Coast for secondary school. I attended Matthew Flinders Anglican College, graduating in 2012 and was lucky enough to receive provisional entry into the MD program at UQ.

Considering 10 of my classmates at Flinders (including a couple of guys I still live with) had already applied to King's, I figured it must be worth a look.

After seeing the colleges on open day, it was a no brainer. The pool, the gym, the guys – it's all there. I spent my three undergraduate years at King's, studying a Bachelor of Science. And what a three years it was. The standard Thursday exchanges, the difficult Friday morning 8.00ams, the balls, the sport – all great fun for a fresher straight out of school. The social aspect is a given, but it's difficult to explain the mateship that forms within a College of 300 men.

Moving through King's gave me a chance to meet one of my great mentors – Emeritus Professor Trevor Heath. Trevor's official role at King's is Academic Consultant but as he openly admits, his advice extends far past which subjects to take. He talks openly about his



APRIL, A SQUAD OF 30 KINGSMEN TOURED HONG KONG TO COMPETE IN THE WORLD'S MOST PRESTIGIOUS RUGBY 10S TOURNAMENT, THE GFI HONG KONG 10S. WHILE THE TOUR SERVED AS A CELEBRATION OF THE HARD WORK AND TALENT OF KING'S ATHLETES ON THE SPORTING FIELD, MEMBERS OF THE TOUR ALSO ENJOYED THE UNIQUE CULTURAL EXPERIENCE OF TOURING ONE OF THE WORLD'S CAPITAL CITIES.

King's tour-members were able to network with industry professionals in Hong Kong at several dedicated careers nights, designed to raise awareness of Hong Kong as a potential workplace for any career. Tour-members experienced the very best of what Hong Kong had to offer professionally, socially and culturally while also making their mark on the Hong Kong Football Club stage.

Coached by former College Student President David Jackman and Jarrod Kidston, King's Rugby 10s team defied their 10th place seeding to reach the Plate Semi-Finals on debut, winning the Team of the Tournament award in the process.

Headlined by some of Queensland Rugby's brightest young stars, King's on-field performance was praised by the tournament's commentators.

"These King's College lads have really impressed me today," one pundit said. "What a fantastic team they've been to watch. Their physicality has been unbelievable."

"It's very good seeing these guys, who are all young men, not get intimidated by their surroundings or whoever they're playing against."

"They're definitely fearless and they just don't care who they're up against," another continued. "They've gone out and shown with their actions that this is how we play: we're hard, we're physical, we're fast, and you'll play at our level until we get home."

King's opened their campaign against Hong Kong-based invitational side UBB Gavekal, spearheaded by Melbourne Rebels playmaker Dallan Murphy. The Wyvern forwards played brilliantly to secure a 19-0 victory over the 6th seeded side, announcing themselves as contenders with a reputation for ruthless defence - missing just one tackle the entire match.

Eventual tournament winners, Penguins, composed of the New Zealand domestic competition's most exciting players, were next on King's hitlist. Courageous defence, a clear theme for King's tournament, held the superstar New Zealand side to just one try for 18-minutes before conceding twice at the death to lose 17-0.

King's closed the day with a five-tries to two thumping of the Chinese National team to book a Cup Quarter-Final match-up with professional touring side, Samurai.

Spearheaded by New England Patriot and USA Sevens player Nate Ebner, alongside several English Rugby Sevens representatives, King's opened the scoring through Player-of-the-Tournament contender Jock Campbell. Samurai scored the next two tries before desperately holding out a King's comeback to escape with a 12-7 victory, relegating King's to the Plate Semi-Finals.

A strong Hong Kong Scottish side, boosted by two former Kingsmen themselves (Kane Boucat and Austen Smith), were able to outlast King's to score the game's only points in the final minute to win 5-0. King's finished the tournament in Seventh-place, but showed throughout the GFI Hong Kong 10s that the College was more than capable of a Top Five finish.

Members of the tour went on to enjoy a riveting Hong Kong Sevens tournament that weekend to conclude an unforgettable week.

Coming home from four weeks in India, meeting people, helping others, volunteering, growing as an individual and embracing a new culture has given me a new appreciation on life.

This opportunity was provided through a joint initiative between St Leo's and King's Colleges led by Brother Rob Callan with the assistance of Mr Gerard Keating. Br Rob has led this programme since 1988 and during this time has developed strong connections and relationships that allow us to travel in a safe environment. Mr Gerard Keating is an associate with Edmond Rice and the Christian Brothers.

We travelled through India as a party of 8 students and 2 staff. Each of us had different experiences in life, different religions and different expectations. However, the challenging and confrontational experiences combined with respect united us to form a strong group. Prior to leaving, meetings were held every fortnight to help prepare us for this

trip. This was essential for understanding and to develop social awareness of the environments we entered.

The locations we visited included Kolkata, Varanasi, Delhi, Agra, Jaipur and Channai. Each city visited allowed us to not only explore different sights but also meet new people and truly embrace the selflessness and humbling nature of the locals in each city.

Kolkata was our first experience of India and for me, the most memorable. Here we lived in the Christian Brothers' home in Dum Dum at St Mary's Orphanage. We were welcomed into their home with authentic Indian meals provided to us for Lunch and Dinner. It was here that we attended mass in the morning at the Motherhouse which has become a renowned tourist destination.



We would rise by 4:15 AM to ensure we caught the bus to attend Morning Mass. Morning Mass was very noisy as Mother Theresa wanted her sisters to be part of the active city, not locked away in a remote convent. The chapel is an oasis of prayer and solitude in the chaotic metropolis of Kolkata. After Mass a cup of hot chai, a piece of bread and a banana was provided by the Sisters. It was here we could integrate and socialise with other volunteers from around the world. We then proceeded to our allocated centres which involved taking public transport.

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Each of us had different experiences in life, different religions, different expectations however the challenging and confrontational experiences

The last part of the volunteering was meant to be in Chennai, however this was cancelled due to a national state of emergency owing to flooding. Even though we were disappointed, it gave us an opportunity to visit other parts of India that were not included in the original itinerary including Jodhpur and Udaipur. The scenery and the history observed within these two parts allowed us to gather a further appreciation of the deep cultural values instilled within the individuals. The most noticeable difference observed is everyone is content with what possessions they have. They are by no means materialistic.

There are some parts of the world once visited, that will always hold a special place in your heart. For me, India is such a place. It was an honour to be involved in the inaugural King's and Leo's Indian Immersion trip. I wasn't sure what to expect, however, I knew it would be a worthwhile and life changing experience. Overall, this trip to India has taught me not to worry about the little things in life and to work hard while being content with what you have.






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

MY FIRST EXPERIENCE WITH KING'S **COLLEGE (OR BOARDING FOR THAT MATTER) CAME WHEN I ATTENDED** THE OPEN DAY IN GRADE 11 (2011).

Jamie Smith (the Deputy Master) had been to my High School on the Sunshine Coast to introduce himself and explain the numerous benefits associated with residing at King's while studying. My interest peaked. However, I had no idea of which college I actually wished to attend.

The open days showed me that King's College was full of guys who were both athletic and smart. Nine of us in total came to King's from Matthew Flinders to start in 2013. However, living in separate Flats meant it was time to branch out step out and embrace the unknown. I now have a couple of great mates that will be lifelong friends. It's the enthusiasm, friendship and support these boys have given me that has partly made me into the person I am today - and I am truly grateful to them all. Although many of my mates have now moved on from College, and are living the life of a day student, there are still a few guys around that I know and are there for a chat.

The life at College is more than just the guys you live with; the staff make it all so much more special. Having Mila as my cleaner for 2 years was sensational - she was always there to have a yarn and give me a break from the study. Life at King's would have been nowhere

My third year of study required an entire semester of placement, which I undertook in Nambour. Jamie was fantastic in helping me transition back to living at home, and ensuring my place at King's was there waiting for me on my return in 2016. For me, one of the biggest decisions every year was whether or not to return to College. As it turns out, it was one of the easiest decisions to make - the thought of having to cook, clean, catch a bus made King's more appealing than living in shared accommodation. These reasons also combined with the main reason I decided to stay, the College atmosphere and how it helps you grow.

The advice I would give to any first, second or third year thinking whether to renew their contract, would be to think about how this College has helped you flourish. The support available, through the tutorials and the ease of getting to and from classes, makes it all worthwhile. There are also many opportunities that a College life will provide. Throughout my time at King's and university, I have spoken with a number of people outside of College life on why I chose King's. Thinking back on it now, King's has been an experience of a lifetime, and being in my final year of university, I wouldn't have had it any other way. 



Rev Aubrey Baker (King's '46 - '48)

Aubrey Baker was brought up on a dairy farm outside Gayndah, in the Burnett district of Queensland.

A devout Methodist family formed in him a love of learning, a generosity of spirit, and a commitment to serve his fellow human.

He candidated to serve in the ministry of the Methodist church, and that is what brought him to King's, when it was at Kangaroo Point, around 1946

Like most young adults in a student residential college, the experience for Aub was formative. He studied with people who became life-long friends.

From King's, he served in the Methodist church at Nanango, to which he took his new wife, Ailsa. He later served in Longreach, Barcaldine, Rockhampton, Townsville, and Brisbane.

In Townsville, he was the co-founder of John Flynn College, at James Cook University. His ministry turned to the whole of Queensland, serving as Home Missions Director, preparing the Methodist Church for the coming Uniting Church, and as President of the Conference in 1974.

He then served in Toowoomba, before branching out and serving as a Patrol Padre in the "Burke and Wills" Patrol west of Charleville, with the UCA's Frontier Services.

This ministry rekindled his love for the people of the bush.

His life was marked by that which formed him – a generosity of spirit, service, and a love for his fellow human.

Passed away December 15, 2015, unexpectedly following a hernia operation. A UQ graduate in agronomy, Colin will be remembered for his many scientific contributions to farming, agronomy and agriculture. A dedicated family man, Colin is survived by his wife Rosemary, his children and their families, including eight grandchildren.

John Cribb

(King's '52 - '53)

Passed away 20 March 2016, aged 85.

In 1953, John Cribb, B. Com. and Congregational theolog, was one of the fortunate Kingsmen to occupy one of the buildings scattered around the Kangaroo Point premises which was known as 'The Butterbox'. With a fine baritone voice and an infectious sense of humour, he invited this fresher to join Trevor Harris, Dave Simpson and himself to form a quartet which spread musical delights across UQ.

John became a London Missionary Society missionary in Papua New Guinea, and after Church Union a Uniting Church Minister. However, for him and his wife Hazel, Wales became home. Together they actively walked, spoke and voted for social justice, even after John, in mid-eighties, was diagnosed with prostate cancer. Still asking questions from a mature faith, he died at 'Bryn Cadno', Todleth Hill, UK.
