




As I reflect on 2022 there has been so much to celebrate. However, there are two highlights that perfectly captured the mood of 2022 for me.

We will never forget the memorable toast offered by our oldest Old Collegian, 102-year-old Malcolm Whyte AO (KCSC President in 1942) who was so ably introduced by this year's President, Sam Kanizay.



2022 gave us so many reasons to celebrate and yet there will be more in 2023. The theme of this magazine focuses on the Old Collegians because in 2023 the College and the Association will proudly celebrate the centenary of the foundation of the Old Collegians' Association in 1923.

Trevor Faragher's Centenary history of King's, Men and Masters tells us that the KOCA

"...was formed in 1923, although it is said that four Collegians who joined the AIF in World War 1 and met on the Gallipoli Peninsula formed an unofficial KOCA. Once formed, the KOCA elected the Master as Patron and JA Robinson as inaugural President."

How fitting it was that James Robinson was the first President of the Old Collegians' Association given that he was the first President of the King's College Students' Club in 1913. Today, his family remain very closely connected to the life of the College.

King's College is quite unique among the Colleges at The University of Queensland in terms of the connectedness of its Old Collegians with the College. The College is indeed fortunate that so many Old Collegians continue to support King's though their presence, their philanthropy, and their constant support. On behalf of the College, and as the Association prepares to celebrate a significant milestone, I thank all Presidents of the KOCA and all Old Collegians who have, over almost 100 years, given so very much to the life of this College and still hold it so dear in their hearts.

Thank you all for your support of King's through 2022. Everyone here joins with me in wishing you the blessings of Christmas. May 2023 bring you safety, happiness and good

Centenary of KOCA – celebrating 100 years of the evergreen spirit of King's. 2023 sees the King's Old Collegians' Association Incorporated (KOCA) celebrate 100 years of representative service to the Old Collegians and the King's College community.

The first Old Collegians were created when, after only the second intake of freshmen had been accepted, World War One broke out which largely emptied the College. As the histories or legends of King's have it, the first reunion of Old Collegians occurred on the Gallipoli Peninsula. Officially it was in 1923, that the Association came into being with a simple yet powerful purpose to keep "evergreen the King's spirit of comradeship amongst past Collegians and to render the College love and service in all ways within the power of the Association". 100-years on KOCA continues its efforts to keep the purpose alive and strong.

Since 1923 there have been 34 KOCA Presidents, starting with J. A. Robinson. All have endeavoured to strengthen the College and the bond among King's Collegians. The list of past KOCA Presidents is included in this edition of the Wyvern and in perusing the list, I am reminded that these extraordinary people believed in the purpose of KOCA and guided the Association throughout its history. Upon reflection it is humbling to be afforded the opportunity to act as a custodian of the KOCA.

KOCA would not exist without the exceptional contribution and support of its many members. Whether this be through taking up leadership roles on the Management Committee, representing Old Collegians, attending, and supporting events or providing some guidance to peers and the younger generations of members – so to "kick off" the Centenary year I simply want to convey my thanks to our Old Collegians and acknowledge you all.

Thank you to all the Old Collegians who have participated in the community that is King's College. Thank you to the people who maintain their friendships and reflect fondly on their time at the College or the mateship shared with King's alumni.

I look forward to celebrating the Centenary with you all and to the future of KOCA, may it continue in its mission for another 100 years.



Identifying and recognising Wyvern spirit across the Old Collegians' network

Do you know a King's Old Collegian who has done something amazing, selfless or with devotion and commitment above and beyond?

In the Centenary of KOCA, the Management Committee has launched the inaugural Wyvern Awards seeking to acknowledge and honour the outstanding achievements of our Old Collegians. The awards are created with the vision to celebrate the diverse accomplishments of our alumni community who are making an impact on their communities and a difference in the world, record their legacy and inspire future generations.

A major initiative of KOCA in its centenary year is the identification and honoring of 100 Collegians of note. Nominations will open on 1 December 2022 and remain open until 31 March 2023.

While this initiative has a focus on the Centenary of KOCA, • Successful development and implementation of it is the hope of the Management Committee that the establishment of the awards will be an annual event and contribute to the connections and experience of all in the King's community.



### **KOCA Wyvern Award categories**

#### Young Wyvern

This category recognises young alumni (35 years or younger) whose professional or volunteer accomplishments demonstrate a significant impact – locally, nationally, or internationally. As a young role model, they have worked within their community or profession to create positive impact in their field.

### Community Wyvern

This award recognises an Old Collegian who has demonstrated outstanding service to the community. This can be demonstrated by but is not restricted to:

- Dedication of significant time and resources to community and/or charity activities
- community support activities.

#### The Spirit of Wyvern Award

This is the pinnacle of the Old Collegian Awards. The recipient exemplifies continuous and significant contributions in one or more of these areas:

- Professional achievement career or a leader in their
- Community leadership service or philanthropy
- Inspirational leadership achievement mentoring or

This recipient has, through their lifelong pursuits, made exceptional contributions to their field or community. The recipient is also an exemplar of the King's College ethos and values.

#### How to Nominate

A nomination is submitted using an online form completed on behalf of the nominee.

There are two stages to a nomination:

### Stage 1:

• A written submission using the linked online form detailing why the nominee deserves to be recognised and how they meet the criteria for the award.



Upon receipt of the nomination – you will be asked to email the following:

- One written reference in support of the nomination.
- Any supporting evidence: awards, media clippings, videos, etc.

Nominations can be received from any member of the community, including College staff, Council members, students and other Old Collegians. Self-nomination is permitted with justification in the form.

### Other Nomination Information and Criteria

In addition to Old Collegians, honorary Old Collegians are also eligible.

The Nominee must consent to their nomination.

The Nominee cannot receive more than one award.

### **Selection of Award Winners**

In 2023, in this inaugural year the selection committee seeks to recognize 100 Old Collegians and there will be recognition of a number of people across the award categories and the Selection Committee reserves the right to move nominations across categories.

After 2023, the annual award process will be limited to one winner per category and the Selection Committee will be



appointed by KOCA with input from the Master of the College, but will comprise no fewer than three members sourced from the College from the Fellows, Old Collegians, Student Body or Council.


The awards will be announced at an appropriate Formal Dinner and via social media with a presentation at a Formal Dinner (Date TBC).

#### 2023 Timeline

- Nominations open on 1 December 2022.
- Nominations close at 5:00pm on 31 March 2023.
- The Selection committee will meet in April 2023 and announce the winners no later than 30 April 2023.
- Presentations at a Formal Dinner will be communicated in due course.

### What have been the highlights of your career or personal life thus far?



Don't forget to look back and




appreciate the experiences we had while at King's. The memories made living, studying, and working alongside your closest friends are incomparable.

What years were you at college?

1938-1944 (with a break 1942/3)

Presidential year? 1942

What was the highlight of your time at college, or, your enduring memory?

Wartime restrictions, rationing, blackout, sirens, digging slit trenches in the lawn; the dread and horror of the Freshers' initiation; coxing the four which won the Head of the River for the first time in many years, and being dunked into the river for it (picture in the history book); involvement in a range of interests on campus - dramatic, musical, political...

What course did you study? Where (Campus and Uni if you were at somewhere other than UQ)

Medicine, interrupted to complete a BSc ('42). graduated in '44.

#### What were the highlights or your career or personal life thus far?

The Army, the Rhodes, Oxford DPhil, setting up Clinical Research units in Sydney Hospital (1952-66) and ANU, Canberra, 1966-77; then a complete switch from biomedical stuff to community counselling etcetera - drug and alcohol, Lifeline, marriage counselling ...; then in NT, Canberra Blood Bank etc etc ..

Anecdotes of happenings in a long life, a drink and a chat, glance at my hobby Haiku poems, a big album of photos on computer... (I made a little book of photos "While a Kingsman 1938 - 1944" which I gave to the King's Library or Archives).

### **Stephen Wright**

King's 1978-1982. KCSC President 1981.

I was KCSC President during my 4th year at King's - the honours year of my B.Sc. Honours degree in Mathematics. I had been involved with KCSC previously as canteen convenor during my second year and Minister for Culture during my 3rd year. The latter was the result of a by-election at the start of 1980 - the candidate elected the previous year didn't return to college.

King's at the start of 1981 was, in the words of a senior collegian proposing a toast at the Enrolment Dinner that year, a "good college that with a bit of effort could become a great college." I had passed a happy three years there, making many friends and doing well in academics. For its time. King's was "diverse" (though laughably homogeneous by modern standards). Unusually among the denominational colleges, it embraced people from a wide range of Christian denominations. It was particularly favored among Catholic parents (like mine) who were suspicious of others because of their culture. In fact, at that time, the two schools with the largest contingents of old boys at King's were both Catholic schools: St Patrick's, Mackay (my school) and St Augustine's, Cairns. There was also a wide diversity in the socio-economic background of collegians -more so than other colleges of the time. Having come from a fairly sheltered background, I reveled in the broader community of King's.

At the start of 1981, my goal for King's was to win the ICC Cup, the sporting competition conducted among the seven colleges with male enrolments. I saw it as a way to get us all "rounded up and pointed in the same direction," as the Master, Dr. Grimmett put it at the end of the year. This goal was set not just for the sportsmen among us but also for those (like myself) who lacked the ability to contribute on the field of play but who were willing to lend their moral and vocal support to the effort. It was an ambitious goal! St John's had dominated ICC for the previous five years, usually winning in a rout. There was no particular reason to think that 1981 would be any different. I took our victory in the raft race down the river at the end of O-Week to be a good omen. But the confidence I often voiced early in the year was met by smiles from wiser heads who had seen our hopes dashed too many times.

What followed was a year of ups and downs, studded with magical moments, usually witnessed by large crowds of Kingsmen. I made it a point to attend every single sporting event. The competition see-sawed for most of the year, but in second semester we thrashed John's in the volleyball (which was in its first season of official competition) and then the soccer, and the tide turned our way. Our win was sealed when we romped home in the track and field competition. (Our athletics team had some of the top junior athletes in the state, though national sprint champion Paul Narracott had left King's by that point.)

I listed some of my favourite sporting moments of 1981 in my speech at the KCSC annual meeting that year, and they are still fresh. Nobody who was there could forget running alongside our eight in the ICC Regatta over the final few hundred metres of their race, on the Regatta Hotel bank of the river (opposite the main body of the crowd - Martin Daubney's idea!) as they pulled to their only win of the season - the one that counted! (We had a single oar in the dining room that year - the ICC oar.) In the Rugby League match against Leo's - perpetual premiers - we had a long kick for goal to win at full time, and our regular kicker was injured. A dark horse fresher stood up to take it - and made it! In the swimming, I had to sort out misunderstandings in the scorer's tent in time for the final race - the medley relay - which we won in thrilling fashion to pip Leo's for the competition win. There were "legal" dramas too. Union College had beaten us in a League match but had played a non-collegian in their team, and we had the photographic evidence. After some legal machinations and diplomatic efforts in the ICC Council, we had the result expunged, with even St John's in support.

I accepted the ICC Cup for King's at the ICC Ball at Cloudland Ballroom (demolished soon after). But my personal highlight of 1981 was the moment in the last volleyball match of the season (against IH) when, with the game safely in hand, the convenor pulled a jersey over my head and pushed me onto the court for the final few points. It was my one and only experience playing for King's and I was overwhelmed by the occasion. After making one kill at the net, I played abominably, and was about to be pulled from the game when we stumbled over the line.

The experiences of 1981 bound us together as a college as we joined in a full-throated celebration of the

accomplishment. I was particularly glad for the senior sportsmen in college who had never experienced an ICC win and whose efforts over multiple vears were repayed. For those of us in the spectator galleries, it was just as exciting.

I finished the year with 1st class honors in Mathematics and a University Medal.

Being too lazy to move elsewhere for postgraduate study, I returned to King's as Vice Master in 1982 while beginning my Ph.D. in Mathematics, which I finished in

I left college at the end of 1982, moving to a flat in Taringa, then to Wooloowin in 1984 where I shared a flat with fellow Kingsman Peter Roberts. Peter and his wife Helen (who was the first King's volleyball coach) have remained close, lifelong friends - they still host me on my frequent visits to Brisbane. Another great friend from that time, Tarun Sen Gupta (KCSC President 1984), organizes reunions when I am in town. One of the blessings of growing older is meeting old college friends whom I have not seen in decades, and picking up exactly where we left off. The years fall away.

After my thesis was approved by external examiners at the end of 1984, but before I could attend a graduation ceremony, I moved to a postdoctoral position in the US. I have remained there ever since, working in academic research in Optimization, for the past 21 years in the Computer Sciences Department at the University of Wisconsin-Madison. The job keeps me extremely busy but I am lucky to be a part of a great worldwide research community of optimization people. I have chaired the main professional society in the area. Optimization is booming in part because of its relevance to the fields of machine learning, artificial intelligence, and data science. Optimization provides much of the technology that underlies those areas.

I am always happy to hear from Kingsmen and am easy to find on the internet.

### Old Collegians' Bursaries and Scholarships

Part of the important role KOCA plays, is supporting financially, several funds which provide bursaries and scholarships to Collegians. While there have been various bursaries and scholarships awarded in the 100 years of KOCA, the list below represents the current offering as at 2022.

These are shared here for posterity.

### King's Returning Scholarships

These are awarded to encourage more senior women and men to remain part of the College community. Current second years and above are eligible to apply. Applicants need to address how they have helped others in College; how they have contributed to the social, spiritual and cultural life of the College, how they have contributed to the sporting life of the College and how they have performed academically.

#### · KOCA Weddo Bursaries A and B

Established in 1995 these Bursaries are awarded on terms similar to those used in the selection of Rhodes Scholars.

### The King's Old Collegians' Association Bursaries (The KOCA Bursary)

Awarded as determined by the Board of Fellows on the basis of recommendations from the Master to a student who is eligible to reside in the College while involved in studies at the University. Selection is on terms similar to those used in the selection of Rhodes Scholars.

### • The KOCA Endeavour Scholarship

The aim of the award is to provide some financial incentive to keep a desirable member of the student body in College and/or to relieve the financial burden on someone in residence. The award is made annually and 'in private' by the KOCA after consultation with the Master and Deputy Master of the College. Primarily it is intended to assist a student to continue residence in College and thus is usually made before the end of Semester 1. A candidate for the award should be making satisfactory academic progress in his studies and should be making a significant contribution towards College life.

### Chair of the Senior Common Room Bursary A bursary to support the retention of a third-year or above Collegian who must serve in the capacity of the Chair of the Senior Common Room.

### · Legacy Scholarship

An annual scholarship prize awarded on the basis of need for a family member whose family is or was associated closely with the Australian Defence Forces.

### **AS THEY REALLY WERE**

When the KOCA turns 100 next year, no doubt there will be stories told at gatherings by old men and younger women. We know how these stories get embellished. So, why not be able to check the facts to see how they really were (see photos from The Kingsman 1969). Hopefully, you will be able to do so more easily, when the College Archive is updated and more accessible.

As a contribution to the Centenary celebrations, a group of old collegians has volunteered to form the KOCA Archive Working Group. We have started to put the existing Archive into great shape and to look at what upgrades need to be done to preserve and promote the archival collection.

A great deal of work was done on the Archive leading up to the College's Centenary in 2012. Glenda Murrell worked as the College Archivist in that time to set up a catalogue system and a digital index. The Archive

resides in physical form in the Tower, though there are artefacts throughout the College, such as the dining room artworks. Glenda, Thérèse Eddy, and others put the archival material into better shape. However, over time the collection has become disorganised and has not been updated for ten years.

The volunteer group is examining overarching questions such as how we digitise parts of the collection, and what has to be done about recognising provenance of the

material. However, the initial work has been more practical and good exercise: clear junk off the floor, sort materials, and file boxes in order. Why let doctorates in biological sciences, engineering skills, and professorial supervision rust. Also, a proposal is being prepared for refurbishing the Tower store to make it a more suitable environment for preservation of precious archival material.

Yes, the word archive conjures up the image of old material, but it also means young material must be added to build the story, and then it must be used.

### DIRECTOR OF ACADEMIC & CAREER SERVICES

As I'm sure it has for many of you, celebrating King's 110th Anniversary this year has made me reflect on the College's incredible history, impact on the wider community, and its mission to provide a safe place for university students to continue learning, developing, and excelling in different facets of their life.

This year, coincidentally, we also celebrated a special group of thirdyear students who were the first co-residential cohort at King's. These students will always have a special place in King's history. And although this academic year, unfortunately, commenced with flooding throughout Queensland, this year's cohort was determined to have a successful year nonetheless. We have seen the many hours of hard work, dedication, and determination that our students put into their academic and extracurricular commitments. These qualities have reminded me why I continue to enjoy working at King's and leading the Academic and Careers portfolio. I get to work with talented, optimistic, and promising young individuals all on the pathway

to making significant contributions to society.

There were many successes for King's on the academic front this year worth celebrating. The year started off with welcoming one of the strongest Year 12 cohorts in the College's recent history. Thirty-two Year 12 students in Queensland achieved an ATAR score of 99.95 in 2021, and one third applied to King's for 2022.


We also celebrated the wonderful academic achievements of students at the bi-annual Master's luncheons. In May, 45 students who achieved a GPA of 6.0 or above (out of 7) in Semester 2 2021 were invited to the luncheon, and in September, 53 students who achieved a GPA of 6.25 or above in Semester 1 2022 were

invited. The turnout and discussions around the tables at these luncheons were fantastic.

Moreover, one of the major highlights this year for me and the College overall was how many students were eligible to partake in the College's dedicated annual Academic High Achievers' photograph (see below) - a by invitation only honour for students who achieve a cumulative GPA of 5.75 or above. This year, 110 students were invited to appear in the photo - the largest number in King's history!

It would be remiss of me not to include the academic achievements of some of our Old Collegians as well, as their achievements are equally deserving of recognition:

• at the UQ graduations in July, Patrick Landy (King's 2017-18) was awarded a University Medal. Patrick graduated with a Bachelor of Biotechnology majoring in Molecular Biotechnology with Honours Class I from the Faculty of Science. This makes Patrick the fourth King's student to have been awarded a University Medal in the last two years. He joins **Dr Liam** Spannenburg (King's 2014-16, KCSC President 2016) for Medicine, James Barrett (King's 2015-17) for Mechanical Engineering, and George Emmerson (King's 2018) for Finance and Economics, who were all awarded a medal at the December 2021 graduations.

Sarah Wilkey (King's 2021) was selected as the Valedictorian by UQ's Faculty of Medicine where she delivered her speech as part of the July graduations. Sarah graduated with a Bachelor of Biomedical Science with a cumulative GPA of 6.96. She recently interviewed for the inaugural Quad Fellowship - a program designed to build ties among the next generation of scientists and technologists in Australia, India, Japan, and the United States of America. Sarah is hoping to utilise the scholarship to undertake a PhD in immunology in the USA.

It is also worth celebrating the fact that university Exchange Programs recommenced this semester with the removal of COVID-19 travel restrictions



in many parts of the world. King's had several Old Collegians on exchange in Semester 2 2022. For example, **Liam Colquhoun** (King's 2018-20, KCSC Secretary 2020) is studying at Copenhagen Business School in Denmark and **James Finnimore** (King's 2018-20) is attending University of Manchester in the United Kingdom.

In Semester 1 2023, additional King's students will undertake their own Exchange Programs. **Samuel Alsop** (King's 2021-22) is headed to University of Tübingen in Germany; **Jordan Fleming** (King's 2021-22) to Bogazici University in Turkey; and **Lachlan King** (King's 2021-22), who was recently awarded a New Colombo Plan Mobility Grant, will study at National Taiwan University in Taiwan.

It is also important to celebrate the generosity of our various donors who contribute to a range of scholarships and bursaries including the College's three prestigious Travelling awards, that are based on academic merit and involvement in the King's and wider community. In 2022, the recipient for the:

- Keith McDonald Travelling Scholarship is Megan Galbraith (King's 2020-22) who will undertake an Exchange Program at University of Leeds in the UK in Semester 1 2023.
- Malcolm McDonald Bursary is Neve Collins (King's 2020-22) who will be attending the conference of the European Scientific Working Group on Influenza in Valencia, Spain in September 2023 with the UQ Short Lab Group.
- Pascoe Family Travelling Scholarship is **Matthew Early** (King's 2020-22) who will be undertaking an Exchange Program at Purdue University in the USA in Semester 2 2023.

With regards to the King's Careers & Employability Program, there, too, is much to celebrate given the significant work taking place throughout 2022. I would first like to acknowledge (and celebrate!) the work that our Associate Director of Academic & Career Services, Lynda Murphy, is doing in the College's careers and employability space. Thank you, Lynda!

The College, in conjunction with The King's Old Collegians' Association (The KOCA), offered 4 Society events affiliated to Careers Weeks throughout the year for law, engineering, business/ finance, and health/medical science students, and a Careers Week only (no Society event) for humanities-based students. The inaugural Whyte Pegg Society took place in September where we saw over 50 current and Old Collegians collaborating and networking with industry professionals within the health and medical sciences fields.

King's Careers Weeks and Society events offer a range of workshops tailored to the highlighted field, College visits from professional associations (e.g., Engineers Australia), industry panels and opportunities for industry networking, as well as detailed profiles of Old Collegians succeeding professionally.

In addition, **Max Schroder** (King's 2020-22) was recently selected for the UQ Ventures Singapore Startup AdVenture. He will be in Singapore for 4 weeks learning alongside some of Singapore's best technology start-ups. Max will learn first-hand the process of founding, investing, and growing an early-stage business. We look forward to hearing about Max's experience in Singapore.

Perhaps most notably in the Careers space this year, King's has continued reconnecting and forming wonderful relationships with a range of companies and Old Collegians who have assisted in offering our students, both current and past, work experience. Over the last 1.5 years, through the College's recruitment service, 41 students have been placed in cadetships, internships, graduate roles, and part or full-time work in a range of fields/roles including engineering, finance, marketing, legal, graphic design, consultancy, and health. On the next page is a snapshot of just some of the organisations that have worked with us to provide these opportunities. This range of experiences and connections with The KOCA and wider community in relation to how industry works and understanding the intricacies of professional life are incredibly valuable for students and will no doubt continue to make King's students and alumni highly sought after in the job market. We are incredibly thankful for these relationships with industry and we celebrate their willingness to provide invaluable opportunities to King's students.




