

FROM THE MASTER

There are three questions asked of prospective students at interview when they apply to live at King's College. Why Brisbane? Why UQ? Why King's?

These may seem obvious but we have had such a phenomenal increase in applications, that these three simple questions hold particular significance. Let me address each question and give some additional insight into why they hold such importance.

Why Brisbane?

King's College will always prioritise those students who do not live nearby and truly need to live on campus. After all, this is why King's College was established – to provide accommodation for rural/regional students. Of course, these days, many more students are seeking the "College experience" rather than just having somewhere to lay their head. In fact, at the Parents' Cocktail party recently, a Kingsman whose son is now at King's commented how much had changed in that context since he was at King's.

"Then," he said, "King's was just somewhere you slept and studied. Yes, you played sport and socialised but Colleges weren't as popular as they are now. Most people who lived in Brisbane didn't even know that Colleges existed."

However, the fact that so many local students now know about the advantages of "living on campus", has created a steady increase in applications from that demographic over the last ten years. Fortunately, our ever-expanding Associate Member program allows many Brisbane based students to enjoy the many "added extras" King's provides. Being an Associate means having a base on campus that offers students new and varied experiences. This is a particularly popular option for those who live in the outer suburbs and would like somewhere to "hang out" during the day – have lunch, go for a swim in the pool, attend tutorials or study in The Learning Centre. They have a social experience at university in the way that many of us did prior to the digital era. Importantly, they broaden their social circles to include people from around the nation and the globe and this can only further their personal and professional growth.

This brings me to discussing our interstate students. Large numbers of interstate students are on the move to Brisbane because of the weather, size, proximity to beaches north and south of the city and the promise of what's to come in the lead up to

2032. Moreover, Queensland became inordinately more popular during and after COVID and as King's College did not ever shut down, we lived a reasonably 'normal' life within the parameters of the pandemic. Once the trend was set, there was no going back. Students who are applying want The University of Queensland because of its reputation as a globally renowned research-intensive University which is consistently recognised as a world leader in higher education. Additionally, they are attracted to the broad range of degrees and the flexibility to change degrees if they need. As a "sandstone" University, it has a kudos that is recognised internationally.

Finally, why King's College?

With ten Colleges on campus, why would a student choose to come to King's? The responses to this question are varied. They include for community, family, network, hundreds of new friends, sporting and cultural opportunities and success and much more. I am consistently told that "King's is special" and that "King's is unique" and then I'm drawn to ask them to explain. Prospective students then explain that the reputation of King's speaks to independence and opportunities to learn, make mistakes and change. This has always been my philosophy - in my early years as a teacher, in parenting our three sons and now as I approach my 40th year of being involved with and leading Residential Colleges. Our students are still teenagers when they come to us and as such still need nurturing and guiding. We do that at King's in what I perceive to be a 'grown up' way. Students make mistakes but through these they strengthen their awareness of who they are. With the support and experience of the King's staff, mistakes become opportunities to learn. If this is a reputation we have earned, I am glad to hear of it. For whatever reason students apply to King's College, we do our utmost to support and guide them through their formative adult years.

As always, thank you all for your support of King's through 2023. Everyone here joins with me in wishing you the blessings of Christmas. May 2024 bring you safety, happiness and good health.

COUNCIL PRESIDENT

During 2023, the King's College Council actively embarked on a program of renewal and future-focused initiatives to secure and strengthen the legacy of the last 111 years of this beloved institution.



A centrepiece of the Council's work was the unveiling of an ambitious Strategic Plan for 2024-2028. Rooted in deep respect for tradition and a commitment to innovation, the plan sets the stage for a transformative period in the College's history.

The plan was developed, embracing our motto "Veritas Vos Liberabit" (The Truth Shall Make You Free), and included wide stakeholder feedback and participation to ensure it reflected contemporary community sentiment and clearly articulated priorities for current and future residents, supporting the College's mission centred on academic freedom and the transformative power of lifelong learning.

The strategic planning process has been complemented by the updating of the College's Master Plan for our site, ensuring alignment and adequacy of resources and infrastructure. The detailed Master Plan will be unveiled in early 2024.

The Strategic Plan focuses on three key pillars:

1 Quality
2 Impact
3 Development & Innovation

Under Quality, King's College plans to enhance academic and career development by fostering a culture of high achievement and building on the comprehensive academic support program that had seen our residents excel in their studies with increased average GPAs each year. This goal aligns with the Master Plan's vision of maintaining premier tutorial facilities and enhancing public spaces, ensuring an unparalleled experience for students.

In terms of Impact, the College aims to bolster our reputation and offerings by engaging with diverse communities, both domestic and international. This strategy is mirrored in the Master Plan's emphasis on riverfront development, creating unique landscapes that encourage social, cultural, sports, and wellbeing activities.

Finally, Development and Innovation will drive King's College to meet future challenges through effective governance, prudent financial management, and innovative approaches to programs and offerings available through the College. The Master Plan envisioned a campus that supports leadership and engagement in collegial experiences, reflecting the institution's commitment to continuous improvement.

To further support the implementation of the Strategic Plan the Council endorsed a revised organisation structure to align leadership accountability with the strategic goals. The new nomenclature and responsibilities were benchmarked with other similar institutions to ensure clarity of communication as to the focus of the role and department. The new titles to be adopted from 1 January 2024 include a change from Master to CEO, Deputy Master to Deputy CEO (Director of Collegians' Experience), Director of Finance and Operations, Director of Academic and Career Development, and the newly created Director of Engagement and Advancement. We are currently recruiting for the latter role which will be integral in supporting the important work of the College Foundation.

As we plan for the future, our purpose and core values of Integrity, Respect, Courage, Loyalty, and Humility continued to underpin a safe and supportive residence, encouraging students to strive for excellence while acknowledging the challenges we all face at a community and personal level. To ensure that the College continued to drive continuous improvement in all aspects of engagement with residents and wider stakeholder groups, the Council commissioned an independent Community and Culture review. The review highlighted the high value members of the Community placed on the supportive and positive environment the College offered. The Council and Management team now have the opportunity to further reflect and build on the feedback and enhanced understanding of the aspects of College life that contribute to the attainment of our goals of cultivating lifelong learners, nurturing personal growth, and encouraging community engagement.

Looking ahead, the College is poised to continue its legacy of participation, support and excellence in all we do, empowering our residents to positively impact the world around them. As King's College embarks on the next phase of our exciting journey, the Council and management team, so ably led by Greg Eddy, are proud to reaffirm our commitment to playing a small part in nurturing generations of future leaders.

Why UQ?

I hate commutes and had already been offered a place at King's. UQ also offered the accelerated integrated Master of Engineering with the Bachelor's degree - a real bonus!

Why King's?

Whether to reside on campus or in alternative accommodation was the first stepping stone to arriving at King's. Coming from a smaller town meant not having a pre-existing friend group in Brisbane. The appeal of being in a community of other people in the same situation was comforting and made the transition of moving out of home easier.

As to specifically choosing King's, I think I have to thank a bit a naivety and luck; my first day seeing the College was the first day of O-Week. My thought process was limited. I knew of a few people from my school who had gone, and my high school friend was also going. I should note that I applied for St. John's and Cromwell, but the speed at which my Mum and Rachelle became friends over the phone solidified my pick very easily.

With a little extra research, I could have found the following reasons, and the reasons why I ended up staying. I found the relationship the College had with its alumni unmatched, and the opportunities made available through these connections valuable to my career progression. Through taking advantage of the academic support at King's I was able to really excel at University. I have since found that through careful wording, many College positions can be written to appear extremely impressive on a resume.

What was your favourite memory / experience of your first year at King's?

Being part of one of the last QLD cohorts where half the grade finished high school at a fresh 17, there were many under 18s at the College in early 2019. Sectioned in our own Flats, we were able to really develop our creativity skills to find entertainment. An interesting observation I made is how much faster the under 18s became colloquial with Greg and Peter, no doubt due to them feeling excluded in our makeshift Thursday night exchanges in C Flat. The highlight of my fresher year, as I imagine for many, was O-Week.

What did you get involved in at UQ and King's?

During my time at King's, I played in band-fest annually and convened King's in Pink, later becoming RA and Chairman of the SCR. Additionally, I capitalised on the social strengths of the College and quickly realised the value of a good suit. I very soon came to realise the importance of juggling my studies with a strong social life, having now maintained friendships made from day one at King's.

What support services did you use at King's?

Throughout my entire time at King's, I took full advantage of the tutorial program. For some higher-level courses, the tutors provided invaluable support and guidance through critical milestone assessments. It's thanks to this support and developing healthy study habits that I am now able to give back to this program as a tutor.

The friendly nature of the staff ensured that there was also someone ready to have a conversation about uni or just life. These relationships also allowed me to utilise the admin colour printer and binder for hefty assignments at short notice.

Where are you professionally today?

During my time at King's I worked part time at Action Drill and Blast as an undergraduate engineer. My role entailed regular visits to various mine sites around Australia where I worked and developed my Master's Thesis project.

I recently showcased this project through a technical presentation at the International Society of Explosive Engineers (ISEE) Australian Conference. This was a fantastic opportunity to display my work as a young professional to other eager minds within the field.

It was at the Watson Miles Society networking event earlier this year that I connected with former Kingsman, Doug Logan from Axiom. During this evening, we found common professional interests and I was ultimately able to secure a graduate role within his company. Without the established relationship that King's fosters with its alumni via KOCA, this wouldn't be possible. I look forward to returning to King's as an industry professional to give similar opportunities to future King's Collegians.

Why Brisbane?

During high school, I had my sights set on attending college in America on a tennis scholarship. However, the arrival of the COVID-19 pandemic altered my plans significantly. Living in Victoria, I experienced the challenges of intermittent lockdowns for two years. When restrictions began to ease towards the end of 2021, my family and I still had concerns about international travel, given the uncertain times. The idea of being far from home without much support didn't sit well with us. So, I began exploring options closer to home, and Brisbane emerged as an appealing choice due to its warm weather and closer proximity to my family.

Why UQ?

When my Dad introduced the idea of The University of Queensland (UQ), it wasn't just the academic reputation that caught my attention; it was also the impressive learning and sports facilities. Brisbane's climate was ideal for an active lifestyle, and UQ offered a variety of degree programs and great campus amenities, which appealed to me.

Why King's?

Choosing the right accommodation was a crucial decision for my university life, and my mum played a pivotal role in this process. She did lots of research, sought advice from friends, and communicated with various colleges. After reviewing her findings, King's College stood out to me. I was captivated by the sense of community and the emphasis on participation in sports, education, and culture. It just felt like the perfect fit for me, and fortunately, King's agreed that I belonged here and accepted my application. I'm so grateful, as the King's community is very special and something I love being part of.

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FROM THE **DEPUTY MASTER**

Why Brisbane? Why UQ? Why King's?

WHAT MADE YOU DECIDE ON BRISBANE, UQ AND KING'S.

As I have reflected through many conversations since my arrival at King's in April of this year, I feel as though I have been a distant cousin of King's College for some time.

As an educator, I have had the privilege of teaching at many fine institutions and through these, I've been a part of the King's experience and traditions for some time.

So where did it start for me. My mother often says that from the early age of 3, I was taking charge of the operations at the sand pit at the local playground. Organising the teams, setting the direction, and getting things moving. These organisational traits served me well as I embarked on a music performance, direction and teaching pathway which saw me directing shows, touring around the country, and working with some of the industry's top artists. Teaching was something that presented very early for me. In fact, I was employed by my high school when I was still in school to teach within the music faculty. I pass on my apology to those students whom I taught. Teaching, and leading a College is a privilege. Having the opportunity to steer students in the right direction and support them to grow personally and professionally is an extremely rewarding part of the role and one that I take particularly seriously.

So, through my teaching career spanning 24 years, I have had the benefit of working within single sex and co-educational environments, and this has enabled me to best understand the complexities that come both academically and pastorally within these settings. I am familiar with King's College due to the connections that many of my students, their families and their extended families would speak of across the many institutions I've worked. In fact, many of my closest friends came to King's and currently, there are students at the College I once taught when they started in Prep and traversed primary school and high school.

So, what made us decide on Brisbane, on UQ and on King's?

When chatting with my wife Chelsey when considering the move from the Sunshine Coast, there was a strong desire for change as we had both been working within the P-12 setting for some time. This environment is increasingly becoming a space where politicians are setting the directions around academic policy and compliance, and the schools that we all remember are slowly changing. Working very much in the executive leadership space, I saw the pressures emerging between good teaching and compliance, and sadly, often a lack of strong leadership where decisions are founded on what is best for the student, verses an alternate self-serving agenda. Chelsey and I chatted about what a change of setting may look like for us as a family. With a 1-year-old and a 3-year-old, we chatted about the experience of a residential position, something familiar to me, and the benefits to both us and the broader college. Many a mention has been made to us already on the positive impact that our children have made on the community here at King's, Likewise, having 420 big brothers and sisters has seen both Delilah and especially Brady come out of their shells and become much more confident. We have also noticed that it draws out the absolute very best in our collegians and tries in part to replicate what a family experience would be like, if they were not at College. This experience is certainly a current uniqueness that King's has over the other 9 UQ colleges.

Finally, The University of Queensland is very well known for its world ranking, it continues to lead in the research and innovation space, and it is situated in one of the best places in Brisbane. The ICC competition is unique, and an ever-prevalent drawcard that attracts students to the region. Many may suggest that it was the riverfront location of the Deputy Master's residence that got us across the line, and there may be some truth to that, but it is genuinely the reputation of King's, as one of the leading Colleges in the country and one that is embarking on an exciting strategic direction in this space. A space where on day one of my tenure I was leading an exciting Strategic Plan renewal and looking towards what the future looked like. A space where culture and traditions are lived, and people are not afraid to discuss change or embrace it. All these things combined to make this decision a very easy one for us and we foresee that there will be a long future for us at King's as we continue to push the boundaries in our thinking and look globally as we set our benchmarks on what a modern College experience is now and into the future.

This allows KOCA to take advantage of key opportunities in the future as and when the need arises. This plan allowed for significant donations to the College bursary funds over the last few years.

The meeting also saw the continuation of Brad De Luca as a KOCA representative to the King's College Council. This is Brad's third and final term as a Council representative. Roger Dooley continues as Patron of KOCA.

ROWING **TOUR** 2023

For the fourth time in the history of the Boat Club, 14 students and 2 coaches departed Australia in mid June for a three-week rowing tour of the UK.

The comprehensive Careers and Employability program at King's College means our students are equipped to capitalise on upcoming opportunities. Over the past two years, expansion of the services on offer demonstrates our unwavering commitment to the professional development of each individual. Expansion of the King's College Recruitment Service, Careers webpage, Jobs Board. and Careers Week provide students with a wealth of resources and opportunities for connections.

The cornerstone of the program is the annual Careers Week, tailored to the five largest cohorts at the College; Law (March), Humanities (April), Finance & Business (May), Engineering & IT (August), Health & Medical Sciences (September). This weeklong event allows students to engage with Old Collegians and industry professionals, gaining valuable insights into their respective fields. Workshops, tours and presentations by local companies, professional associations, and subject matter experts provide a rich variety of sessions from which to choose.

One of the highlights of Careers Week is the discipline-specific professional development event facilitated by the King's Old Collegians' Association (K.O.C.A). The events held in Semester were the Watson Miles Society for Engineering and the Whyte Pegg Society for Health & Medical Sciences, Attended by Old Collegians and other industry professionals, these events foster connections between current students and alumni, often leading to employment

In recent times, more than 60 students have started employment in professional roles through introductions made via the King's College Recruitment Service. Ensuring they put their best foot forward, students can access one-on-one support and/or group workshops to learn about resume writing. interview skills and how to build their job search strategy.

In a significant milestone, King's College hosted its first-ever Careers Fair in October, making history as the first college on the UQ campus to organise an event of this magnitude. The fair featured exhibitors from 32 organisations across various sectors, reinforcing King's College's reputation as a prime destination for early career talent. Just two weeks after the event, four students had secured interviews for promising career opportunities they were introduced to during the Fair, underlining its essential role in shaping the future of King's College students.

Partnership with KOCA was particularly strong in 2023, their Centenary year, and I was delighted to see at least 9 Old Collegians in their company booths at the Careers Fair. We are truly fortunate to be surrounded by an exceptional network of alumni who are not only leaders in their respective fields but also committed mentors to the next generation. My heartfelt thanks to all who have offered their support.

King's College, Brisbane, and UQ combined offer a unique opportunity for students to not only excel academically but also to be well-prepared for the professional world. With the upcoming launch of the Wyvern's Mentor Program, 2024 holds even greater promise for students looking to shape their future and I am inspired and excited for the year ahead.

I had the incredible opportunity to travel overseas to ESWI Influenza and SARS-**COV-2** reparatory virus Conference held in Valencia, Spain in September 2023.
